Zios and Zepts

On the planet Vuv there are two sorts of creatures. The Zios have 3 legs and the Zepts have 7 legs.


The great planetary explorer Nico, who first discovered the planet, saw a crowd of Zios and Zepts. He managed to see that there was more than one of each kind of creature before they saw him. Suddenly they all rolled over onto their backs and put their legs in the air.

He counted 52 legs. How many Zios and how many Zepts were there?

Do you think there are any different answers?

Reach 100

Here is a grid of four "boxes":



You must choose four **different** digits from 1–9 and put one in each box. For example:

5	2
1	9

This gives four two-digit numbers:

52	(reading along the 1st row)
19	(reading along the 2nd row)









51	(reading down the left hand column)	
29	(reading down the right hand column)	

In this case their sum is 151.


Try a few examples of your own.

Your challenge is to find four different digits that give four two-digit numbers which add to a total of 100. How many ways can you find of doing it?

Making a Difference

There are a number of ways the digits 2,5,7,8 can be placed in a subtraction sum like the one below:



In this example, the answer is 29.
