On this YouTube version it has pictures from the story – what do you think about the picture choices? Do you think they match the feeling of the music at that stage or would you change them?</p> <p>I really like this section of the book version of the story:  <i>The tiger’s roar filled the cave with thunder. Mother Wolf shook herself clear of the cubs and sprang forward, her eyes, like two green moons in the darkness, facing the blazing eyes of Shere Khan.</i></p> <p>What kind of a scene does this set? What genre (action/horror/ comedy/adventure?) would you describe it as? Which part of the music do you think fits to this piece of text?</p> <p>Draw or paint a picture that could accompany this piece of text – try to include all of the details listed in your representation. Extra challenge: Create a word bank of vocabulary that would describe the actions of the Mother Wolf and Shere Khan characters.</p>

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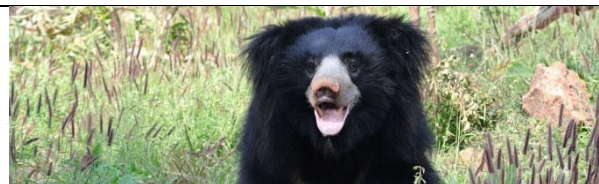

He knew that there were elephants all around Kala Nag, and that there was no chance of backing him out of the assembly; so, he set his teeth and shivered. In a Keddah at least there was torch-light and shouting, but here he was all alone in the dark, and once a trunk came up and touched him on the knee.</i></p> <p><i>Then an elephant trumpeted, and they all took it up for five or ten terrible seconds. The dew from the trees above splattered down like rain on the unseen backs, and a dull booming noise began, not very loud at first, and Little Toomai could not tell what it was; but it grew and grew and Kala Nag lifted up one fore-foot and then the other, and brought them down on the ground – one – two, one – two, as steadily as trip-hammers. The elephants were stamping altogether now, and it sounded like a war-drum beaten at the mouth of a cave.</i></p>

He is based on an Indian animal called a ‘sloth bear’.</p> 

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Sloth bears are not actually related to sloths at all! It is thought that in the 1700s they were misclassified as sloths because they have long claws and live in trees!

Today create a fact file about sloth bears using these headings: Appearance (how they look), Habitat (where they live), Feeding Habits (what, where and when they eat), Conservation (what is happening to look after sloth bears). You could even include a diagram or photograph of sloth bear with a caption or labels.
